Employer: The PEI Human Rights Commission, (HRC), is an independent organization whose purpose is to enforce the PEI Human Rights Act through a complaint process, dispute resolution and adjudicative function, educate the public and advise government in the field of human rights. The HRC promotes accountability, dignity, respect and inclusiveness.

Tasks & Responsibilities: The opportunity to participate in the work of the HRC, including:

- conduct human rights research and prepare related reports;
- assist in the day to day operation of the HRC;
- create and develop educational materials and presentations;
- observe and participate in the investigation, adjudication and resolution of complaints.

Duration: 10-14 weeks (dates to be determined)

Hours: Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. Some alternative hours may be required.

Education: Post-secondary student or recent graduate. Preference will be given to law students, however students in education, social justice, indigenous students, para-legal or other relevant fields or with relevant work experience will be considered.

Funding for this application is provided in part by the Canada Summer Jobs Grant, which requires applicants to be between 15-30 years of age at the start of employment, be a Canadian citizen, permanent resident or person on whom refugee protection has been conferred under the Immigration Refugee Protection Act, and legally entitled to work in PEI.
